



We envision a world where women and girls in rural and refugee communities have the opportunity for a high quality of life while serving as a steward to create a more sustainable planet.


## **Our Mission**

# Women's Economic Empowerment 864

Refugee women and girls participated in economic development activities to increase their skills and income

55

Through our Women's Economic
Empowerment program, we supported
596 to participate in savings and
lending groups, who jointly
accumulated over \$6500 worth of
capital that they used to provide over
370 loans to their members during 2021.
The loans were mainly used to purchase
food in response to the increasing food
security particularly among women led
households. Others used the loans to
pay school fees and to improve their
housing situation.

In addition, the savings groups provided a platform through which Shared Action
Africa engaged the women and girls to participate in various development and advocacy programs that had an impact on their lives during they year. Such activities communal and kitchen gardening, and counselling and provision of family planning and other sexual and reproductive services, among others.



# **Vocational Education**

# 56 Single mothers and school dropouts gained trade and employable skills

Through our Vocational and Education Training Program and in partnership Nakivale Women's Sewing Center, we run a six months tailoring program that targeted 56 young women, particularly single mothers and girls, particularly school drops ages 18-24 in Nakivale Refugee Settlement. During the training, they were skilled in fashion and design, tailoring, and the making of handcrafts including grocery bags, purses, and table mats, among others. In addition, were provided soft skills including customer care, how to plan and manage an enterprise, savings, budgeting, debt management and record keeping. After the training, 30 of the 56 trained young women, 30 came together and formed a savings groups with the objective of pooling money from which they could borrow and use to start individual tailoring business as well as meet their immediate financial needs.



# Building Resilience of Refugee Women to Climate Change

In 2021, Shared Action Africa supported 419 refugee women to engage in kitchen gardening as an adaptative strategy to weather variability due to a changing climate in Nakivale and Oruchinga Refugee Settlements. Kitchen gardening was promoted because very little water is needed to group the crops, mainly vegetables on a very small plot of land, usually in the backyard of one's of home. In addition, if well managed, has the potential to provide nutritious foods, particularly vegetables for the family all year round, thus contributing to a more balanced diet and healthy families.

"While my family and I consume some of the vegetables I grow in my kitchen garden for our health needs, I also sell the surplus in my shop, and this supplements the income I generate from my other business. This income helps me meet basic needs like buying food, emergency drugs for minor illnesses, clothing, and also my weekly basis savings in my savings group." Beatrice Nimbonera, a widow and refugee from Burundi.

# Refugee Women Access Energy Efficient Cookstoves

#### Refugee Women Access Energy Efficient Cookstoves

During 2021, 38 refugee women in Nakivale Refugee Settlement were supported to continue using the energy efficient cookstoves that were subsidized by SAA through it's Refugee Women Energy Efficient Cookstove access Programs to ensure that their energy efficient cookstoves remain efficient and wood is the most important energy source for cooking in households.

"I am grateful that I got this energy an energy efficient cookstove. Using it to cook our food helped me reduce the amount of money I used to spend on charcoal by almost 50% per month. It is for this reason that I continue attending sessions that will help me keep my cookstove working efficiently" Sifa, a mother of three and a refugee from the Democratic Republic of Congo

# Reproductive Health and Rights

2,302
Women of Reproductive age accessed family planning and cervical cancer screening Services

During 2021, Shared Action through its Integrated Family Planning Program, supported 2,302 refugee women and nationals of ages 15-49 to access family planning and cervical cancer screening services. This was achieved by addressing both the supply and demand-driven barriers impeding them girls and women from accessing and utilizing these services. These include among others debunking myths and misconceptions that discourage voluntary family planning seeking behavior as well increasing of knowledge on the family available planning methods available in the project area.

Holding community reflective dialogues, combined with continued counselling and provision of family planning methods to improved family seekina behavior in Nakivale and Oruchinga refugee settlements. Access to family planning resulted in better health and economic outcomes for women because women were able to have more time outside their home and participate more in economic and social activities. Similarly, the women who used contraceptives reported to having better health and energy to look after themselves as well as their families.



## **IMPACT STORY**

Francoise Gahinja and her husband Bonane Habarurema are 37-year- old refugees from Rwanda who have settled in Isanja village, Nakivale refugee settlement. They have eight children and their ninth child passed on three years ago. Francoise and her husband have experienced difficult times due to having a large family that they cannot provide for. It is for this reason that they agreed to use family planning, and also opted for a permanent method a Bilateral Tubal Ligation (BTL).

"When we were counselled about family planning, we were not aware that we could access a permanent method in the settlement, and therefore would not have to travel over 80Kms to access the same. We decided to opt for a BTL because we had a big family, and we are very thankful to Shared Action Africa for supporting us through this process. Having a BTL liberated myself. I am now able to enjoy sex without worrying about getting pregnant, more importantly, I now attend my savings groups group meeting regularly."





# **Advocacy Initiatives**

During 2021, Shared Action Africa under the Economic Justice Project mobilized 594 refugee women Savings and Lending Groups (594 women) to launch a movement they called The Refugee Women's Movement that successfully lobbied the Office of the Prime Minister for 6.5 acres of land on which they established 6 communal gardens, and which they staple foods including beans and groundnuts, which went a long way in improving the diet of over 176 women headed households. In addition, the members of the 6 Savings and Lending groups sold the surplus from the harvest and earned some income

Similarly, during 2021, Shared Action Africa under the Arise for Youth Reproductive Justice mobilized 170 adolescent girls (150) and boys (20) and formed the Youth SRHR Collective for Nakivale and Oruchinga Refugee Settlements. The Youth SRHR petitioned Collective UNCHR, Medical Teams International and the Office of the Minister requesting Prime the three institutions to establish youth friendly corners at 3 selected health facilities in order to increase young people's access to youth friendly sexual and reproductive services which were not available at all health facilities within Nakivale and Oruchinga refugee settlements.







# 2021 FINANCIALS

During Our financial year for 2020/21 running from July 1, 2020 to June 30, 2021, the organization raised \$102,544, of which \$87,970 (86%) was raised through Foundations, 821 (1%) from individual donors, \$8,753 (8%) from Partner organization and \$5,000 (5%) came from the board of directors.
